





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With winter weather approaching, ice will soon be forming on our lakes. When ice forms and repeatedly thaws, due to temperature variations, the remaining ice becomes unsafe. In this part of the country, we seldom have sustained freezing temperatures that will form ice to a thickness that is safe to support people and animals. We kindly ask that you stay off the ice.

In previous years, there have been incidents on Tipton Lakes where animals had to be rescued after falling through thin ice. In addition, in past years, reports have been made to the Association Office that adults and children were walking on unsafe ice in the canals and on the lakes.

All residents should be mindful of the dangers of walking on ice, for themselves and their pets. If members observe others who do not understand this danger or ignore this caution, they are encouraged to speak to the members who are in potential danger and report such incidents to the Association Office at 812-342-8522. If, however, a member witnesses someone in distress, please call 911 for emergency assistance.

Ice and Rip Rap

The rip rap around the edge of the lake is there to protect our shoreline. The rip rap costs all of us money and is expensive to replace.

If you observe someone throwing rip rap onto the ice or into the lake, please ask them to stop and report the activity to the Association Office at 812-342-8522. Thank you for your assistance!

It's autumn, and we've had the first frost. Now, is the time to finish up this year's garden. Like any gardening experience, my garden this year has been a mixture of successes and failures. Gardeners need to enjoy all the fresh produce, but also to be prepared for some failure. Gardening is a good antidote for perfectionism. This year has been one of the most challenging years to have a successful garden. We have had prolonged periods of excessive heat and very little rainfall. Still, the successes have far outweighed the failures.

We have been eating veggies and fruit from the garden since the middle of April, when the asparagus started to poke up out of the ground. The best practice to harvest asparagus is to cut off nine-inch spears at ground level or slightly below. It kept producing, as per usual, until mid-June.

Then we had plenty of the summer-vegetable varieties, as detailed in a prior article in this magazine. And, we have had a good crop of Concord grapes and Moonglow pears.





AFTER THE FROST

The best Concord grapes were all picked before the frost, but there are still a few lateripening clusters on the vines now in late October.

When the first frost was predicted, it was helpful to put some sheets and towels over the most productive, remaining pepper and tomato plants. We had no frost damage. The weather forecast going forward calls for more warm weather, so we will still get even more production

The tomatoes have slowed way down with the arrival of cold nights and daytime temperatures in the seventies. But there are still some big Celebrity tomatoes ripening on the vines. Plus, there will be green tomatoes to pick when more frost threatens. I have found that some people like fried, green tomatoes that have some nutritional value but don't have the rich flavor of summer tomatoes.


And there are still green peppers ripening and turning red and orange on the plants.





The Butternut winter squash grew all summer in a space behind the peppers and did well despite the drought. Butternut is among the most popular varieties of winter squash because it is basically trouble-free. It has its own ability to repel insects, so one never needs to worry about the bugs getting it, and rabbits and deer don't bother it either.

Plus, this variety of winter squash can be placed in a cool, dry place and left in storage for months, even a year, to be enjoyed. No refrigeration is necessary.



Mars grapes are recommended for the backyard-fruit grower, since they are resistant to certain diseases. They started ripening in mid-October and were not damaged by the frost.

For late season, winter harvest, we set out a row of kale. Last winter, we were still harvesting kale, even after the sub-zero weather. Kale needs to be protected from wildlife.





And, of course, we have been picking apples and storing them in the garage fridge at 40 degrees Fahrenheit.



Altogether, this year's garden has been supplying us with veggies from mid-April and will continue until after the snow falls.

Despite the difficult growing conditions this year, we have had an abundant harvest from our backyard garden. We have had plenty for ourselves, our children, grandchildren and friends who enjoy fresh organic produce.

FINISHING UP THIS YEAR'S GARDEN

I just finished spreading the annual ryegrass seed on the garden, to act as a cover crop over the winter. This will prevent erosion and add nutrients to the soil for next year when I mow it and till it into the earth.

When the hard freeze comes, I will have to take out all the remains of the asparagus, peppers and tomatoes, and compost it. The kale we be there for us over winter, until we start the garden next spring.

Now would be a good time to plan your garden for next spring.



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
New Events Coming in 2025

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Do You Have Renters Living in Your Home?



The Rules and Regulations are designed to give guidance to many of the day-to-day functions of our Association. The Rules and Regulations can be found in your Green Book. Section 4: Leasing Procedures, state that owners are to provide a copy of the lease to the Board of Directors.

LEASE APPROVAL PROCESS AND REQUIREMENTS

Prior to leasing or renewing a lease for a lot or living unit, the owner of the lot or living unit shall provide the following to the Board of Directors:

- (a) a copy of the proposed lease or lease renewal, with rental amounts omitted or redacted.
- (b) the name(s) of the lessee(s)/tenant(s).
- (c) the terms of the lease or lease renewal.

Once a copy of the lease is received and approved, the renter is listed in our database and is considered a member of the Association along with the lot owner. In fact, lot

owners and renters each receive one vote on the Association's issues. If you are an owner and an occupant, you are entitled to two votes regarding Association issues. Annual Meeting packets include two proxies: one vote for the owner (Class A) and one vote for the occupant (Class B).

In addition, the renter is entitled to utilize the Association's common areas and receive Association news and correspondence. Plus, we would like the opportunity to welcome your renter and make them feel like a part of our Association.


